Benjamin Savage Brookhaven. She was predeceased by a brother, Frank Savage of Center Moriches, and a son-in-law, Robert Munford of Water Mill.

Dr. John J. Conley

Dr. John J. Conley, a noted surgeon who made important contributions to the treatment of cancers of the head and neck, and a resident of Pond Point in Westhampton Beach since the early 1950s, died on Tuesday, September 21 in a Manhattan hospital. He was 87.

He developed operations that helped patients who lost their voice boxes improve their speech and also developed operations for rehabilitating the larynx and for grafting facial nerves.

While an Army surgeon in World War II, he pioneered methods of reconstructing the cheek and the face.

He was a member of the Westhampton Country Club.

He is survived by his wife, Monica; three children from an earlier marriage, John of Honolulu, Mary Conley Downe of Manhattan and Anna of Los Angeles, and three grandchildren.

A mass was held at the Immaculate Conception Church in Westhampton on Thursday, September 23. Burial took place at the Westhampton Cemetery.
